

VALLEY EVENTS IN THE BOOKS AND UNDER WAY



Kevin's solo show, "Time Line:
Sculpture and Drawing by
Kevin Caron," features Kevin's
metal sculpture as well as unusual
drawings of some of his works (one
of which you can see at left).

Presented by R. Pela Contemporary
Art, the show is being held over
until Thursday, April 28, in part to
accommodate a special event,
"How Do Artists Enrich
Community Identity?" This April
7 event, sponsored by the
architectural firm Corgan, featured
art, style and fashion displays and

demonstrations as well as a lively panel discussion with members of the art and fashion communities. It was all part of Phoenix Urban Design Week.

Both the April 7 event and "Time Line" were held at the <u>Central Arts Plaza</u> (formerly the Viad Tower) at 1850 N. Central Ave. CAP is open daily, Monday through Friday.

Meanwhile, the special gathering for artists at "Endless Line: the 3-D Work of Kevin Caron" was also presented by R. Pela Contemporary Art. About 20 members of the Breakfast Club group of midcareer artists participated in this really special event. They gathered to learn more about what Kevin is doing and, perhaps most important, *how* he is doing it. "It was nice to share what I've learned with my peers," says Kevin. He had a 3D printer running during the event, which made it easier for people to understand the process and results.

PRIVATE EVENTS COMPLETE THE SEASON

As spring warms into summer, Kevin looks back on a rich opening season. On March 3, he was pleased to welcome members of **Scottsdale Leadership** to Pearson & Company to see some of Kevin's sculptures and hear him talk about his work. He also hosted Mesa Community College students from the **Welding Metal Sculpture** classes to his studio on March 12. On April 3, he had a lively **Open Studio** with visitors who came from as far away as Texas. "Open Studios are always fun," Kevin says.

Tools have always been more than just the way Kevin makes his art. "His forms are clearly influenced by the tools he uses today and that he has used all his life," says Fran Reich, a longtime patron.

While some of his sculptures, such as <u>Easy In</u>, are obviously influenced by machinery, others more subtly reference tools in their forms and proportions, such as sculptures in his <u>Gordian</u> Accordian series.

It's uncertain if Kevin will be artistically inspired by his latest purchase, but he is definitely glad to have it. "I've been talking about getting a forklift for a while," he says. The used Daewoo forklift has a 4,000 pound capacity and solid pneumatic tires, which means it can operate in dirt or on pavement, a must at the studio. It runs on propane, which quickly earned it its name, "Stinky."



Stinky will enable Kevin to move heavy materials - like his recent need to move two 55-gallon drums of railroad spikes - as well as moving raw steel and even some completed sculptures.

Kevin's collection of equipment has grown over the years through strategic purchases, and he uses all of them. "The right tool for the right job makes it easier to create what I see in my head," he says. "I am less distracted by the process, which enables me to focus on what's important."

SURPRISE NEWS IS GOOD NEWS



While it is a surprise to see Kevin in a suit, that's not the news he'll be announcing soon.

We can't reveal the details yet, but we wanted to let you know first that he met with the Surprise City Council on Tuesday, April 5, and their decision was unanimous.

UNDER WAY IN THE STUDIO

FireStick is now installed at its north Scottsdale home. While we don't have an official photo yet, you can see a photo taken just after installation on FireStick's own page.

Meanwhile, Kevin is wrapping up two commissions - <u>Centurion</u>, which is just back from the powder coater, and <u>RainBow</u>, which is headed there - and he's working on two more. "I really enjoy commissions," Kevin says. "Each comes with its own challenges, whether it's artistic, technical or some combination." <u>See Centurion</u> in its new home, and <u>RainBow</u> before it got its finish.



Revin is finally getting to the prickly part of the sculpture **Prickly Passion**. Like RainBow, this sculpture was commissioned for a New York sculpture and horticultural garden. The owner admires desert flora, and combining his affection for sculpture and plants, he commissioned Kevin to create for him what simply won't grow in his climate. "I'm not trying to compete with Mother Nature," says Kevin, "yet my desert plants are definitely hardier." With the pads of this prickly pear cactus fabricated, he is now working on adding the spines. Next stop will be the powder coater. "You won't believe the color," adds Kevin. Afterward, the flowers (*left*) will be painted by hand. Watch Prickly Passion grow on its own page.

The other commission is a sound sculpture titled **Riddle Me This** that Kevin is creating for a couple in Prescott.

They learned about Kevin through <u>Van Gogh's Ear gallery</u> in that northern Arizona city. "They saw Ding Dong and wanted one of their own, but with a lower tone," explains Kevin. Like most of his sound sculptures, this one will have an oxidized (rust) finish. <u>Watch it develop</u> on its own page.



HOW DO YOU DECIDE WHEN TO BUY A NEW TOOL?

"If I had my way, I'd need a whole 'nother building for all the tools I'd like to own. That isn't realistic, though, especially when it comes to budget and, oh yeah, that other building I'd need.


"Because I create for a living, though, getting new tools makes sense when it will save me time and money in the long run. So before I buy any tool that costs more than \$200, I run through a checklist:



- 1. How will I use this tool for this project?
- 2. How might I use it in the future?
- 3. Does it help me with any activities that I'm already doing but could do better?
- 4. If I buy it, is there anything else I need to have to use it?
- 5. Where can I store it safely?
- 6. Can I afford it?
- 7. What will it cost to maintain it?
- 8. Will the cost be offset by time or money savings?
- 9. Have I rented this tool three times or more?

"Often after I buy a tool I find myself using it for things I hadn't thought about before, but I'm always glad I have it."
