SOLO SHOW RECEPTIONS FEBRUARY 26 AND MARCH 4

After its February 5 opening to an enthusiastic crowd, Kevin's solo show "Endless Line: 3-D

Printed Work by Kevin Caron" wraps up a successful one-month run with a closing reception on **Friday, February 26**. Held at the <u>Walter Art Gallery</u>, 6425 E. Thomas Rd. in Scottsdale and curated by Robrt Pela, this show is the largest collection of Kevin's 3D-printed sculpture in a single exhibit. Kevin's jewelry, created with 3D printing, was very popular.

"I'm so pleased with the way Robrt has presented the art," says Kevin. "With its strong color and reflective surfaces, it was not an easy task to display these sculptures. He did a remarkable job." After the close of the show, there will be a special gathering for artists on Monday, February 29 at 2 p.m. "Many artists are interested in 3D printing, so this is an opportunity for them to see art created with this new technology as well as see a 3D printer in action.



The second show, "Time Line: Sculpture and Drawing by Kevin

Caron," also presented by R. Pela Contemporary Art, features Kevin's metal sculpture as well as unusual drawings of some of his works.

"Many of my works begin in CAD [Computer Aided Design software], which I'd never thought about as drawings, but they really are," says Kevin. Held at

the <u>Central Arts Plaza</u> (formerly the Viad Tower) at 1850 N. Central Ave., this show also opened February 5 and will run through Thursday, March 31. The reception is **Friday, March 4** at 6 p.m. We look forward to seeing you there.

In addition to curating art shows throughout the metro Phoenix area, Robrt Pela's R. Pela Contemporary Gallery in Phoenix hosted 26 shows from 2013 - 2015. A <u>Phoenix New Times</u> columnist for 24 years, Pela is also a longtime contributor to <u>KJZZ</u>'s "Morning Edition."



UNDER WAY IN THE STUDIO

With **Moonshine** completed (you can see amazing photos of it finished on its page), Kevin turned his attention to two commissions.

One of them, a large spike sculpture for a North Scottsdale couple, now has a title: **FireStick**. Kevin's largest spike sculpture yet, FireStick, which you can see him working on above in the opening photo, will also vary significantly from his other spike sculptures. Until now, all of his spike sculptures had oxidized finishes, while FireStick will feature a color scheme that explains its title.

"Those of us who live in the Sonoran Desert are familiar with the variety of pencil cactus that is commonly called FireStick or MatchStick," explains Kevin. "I'm excited that the color, a combination of greens, yellow and brilliant red, will bring the desert inside this contemporary home." <u>Watch</u> <u>FireStick develop</u> on its own page.

Kevin has just finished fabrication on another commission, a sound sculpture for a



Phoenix couple that also just got its title: **Centurion**. "Titles are so tricky," admits Kevin. "Sometimes they come before I even begin fabrication. Other times, like with Moonshine, they come while I am creating, and very occasionally, I name a sculpture after completion." In this case, a flare at the top of the bell stand inspired the title. "It recalls the crest on a centurion's helmet," he explains. The top of the bell itself *(above, right)* is also unusual. <u>See the stand as well</u> <u>as hear Centurion</u> on its own page.

With these pieces completed or awaiting their finishes, Kevin has begun a new commission. **RainBow** will be a water feature similar in spirit to one of his very popular fountains <u>RainHarp</u>. "I get a lot of compliments on RainHarp," says Kevin. "It's fun to tackle a new take on this form." <u>Watch RainBow</u> develop on its own page.

On the 3D printing front, Kevin has just completed his largest bronze to date. Yes, bronze - 3D printing filament is available in several exotic materials. Bronze filament is 80% actual bronze and 20% resin. He created a small version of this design that debuted at the show "Endless Line." The new sculpture is 26" tall. Now that the print is complete, he will spend many hours burnishing the sculpture, titled **The Point**, to bring out the shine. "It almost has a claylike quality at this point," Kevin observes. "And boy is it heavy!" <u>See The Point</u> just after it came off the printer.





NEW VIDEOS ON CHANNEL KEVIN

Creating sculpture takes more than a great idea. When working with metal, it also means more than welding. Most of Kevin's latest videos deal with other, sometimes esoteric but always important issues.

TODAY'S TIP:

HOW DO YOU DECIDE WHICH TOOL TO USE FOR CUTTING METAL?

"When I first began sculpting, I didn't have many choices. I often reached for my plasma cutter, which is a key tool for cutting metal. For thicker metal than my plasma cutter could handle, I'd get out the cutting torch for my oxygen-acetylene welder. If it was thinner stock, I could use an angle grinder with a cutoff wheel.

"For thicker metal, I still reach for that plasma cutter, although now I have one that can cut more than 1"-thick metal - I seldom need that

oxy-acetylene unit for that now. If I'm cutting a curve, my Beverly shear is my first choice. For quick cuts, I'll use my plate shear. I also now have what is called a foot or jump shear for long straight cuts. Using shears cuts down on clean up, which is almost always required when plasma cutting.

"My chopsaw comes in handy when I want to set up repetitive cuts. I used to use it when I needed a super accurate cut, but now my first choice is my horizontal bandsaw. I find myself turning to it more often than I could have imagined - it cuts so cleanly and accurately!"
